Expressed obliquely, through sly innuendo, Lubitsch’s risqué, sophisticated, continental

humor engaged the viewer's intelligence while circumventing the strictures of censorship in such masterworks as *The Marriage Circle*, *Trouble in Paradise*, *Design for Living*, *Ninotchka*, *The Shop Around the Corner*, and *To Be or Not to Be*. McBride's analysis of these films brings to life Lubitsch's wit and inventiveness and offers revealing insights into his working methods.
