If sequencing is required, starting with PMRs would be more effective in boosting output, while starting with LMRs would reduce unemployment faster. Finally, increasing

unemployment benefits would be more effective if this reform takes place after the implementation of LMRs and PMRs.

A Dynamic General Equilibrium model is used to assess the macroeconomic effects of different reform scenarios (isolated, coordinated, or sequenced) that reduce hiring costs and/or firms' entry costs in the presence of a large informal sector. The paper highlights that reforms are most effective if executed in a coordinated fashion, as implementing simultaneous reforms in the labor and product markets could add about 2.5 percent of gross domestic product growth and reduce unemployment by about 2.2 percentage points after five years. If reforms are to be introduced sequentially, due for instance to capacity or political economy constraints, starting with product market reforms is more effective in boosting output in the short-run while starting with labor market reforms would reduce unemployment faster.

Policy Research Working Paper Migrant Labor Markets and the Welfare of Rural Households in the Developing World: Evidence from China - Alan de Brauw 2008

Abstract: In this paper, the authors examine the impact of reductions in barriers to migration on the consumption of rural households in China. The authors find that increased migration from rural villages leads to significant increases in consumption per capita, and that this effect is stronger for poorer households within villages. Household income per capita and non-durable consumption per capita both increase with out-migration, and increase more for poorer households. The authors also establish a causal relationship between increased out-migration and investment in housing and durable goods assets, and these effects are also stronger for poorer households. The authors do not find robust evidence, however, to support a connection between increased migration and investment in productive activity. Instead, increased migration is associated with two significant changes for poorer households: increases both in the total labor supplied to productive activities and in the land per capita managed by the household. In examining the effect of migration, we pay considerable attention to developing and examining our identification strategy.

A Likelihood-based Analysis for Relaxing the Exclusion Restriction - Andrea Mercatanti 2008

This paper examines the problem of relaxing the exclusion restriction for the evaluation of causal effects in randomized experiments with imperfect compliance. Exclusion restriction is a relevant assumption for identifying causal effects by the nonparametric instrumental variables technique, in which the template of a randomized experiment with imperfect compliance represents a natural parametric extension. However, the full relaxation of the exclusion restriction yields likelihood functions characterized by the presence of mixtures of distributions. This complicates a likelihood-based analysis because it implies partially identified models and more than one maximum likelihood point. We consider the model identifiability when the outcome distributions of various compliance states are in the same parametric class. A two-step estimation procedure based on detecting the root closest to the method of moments estimate of the parameter vector is proposed and analyzed in detail under normally distributed outcomes. An economic example with real data on return to schooling concludes the paper.
