In 1953, Winston Churchill received the Nobel Prize for Literature. The Hidden Face of Rights - Kathryn Sikkink 2020-01-07

Why we cannot truly implement human rights unless we also recognize human responsibilities When we debate questions in international law, politics, and justice, we often use the language of rights—and far less often the language of responsibilities. Human rights scholars and activists talk about state responsibility for rights, but they do not articulate clear norms about other actors' obligations.
