Emlyn Williams - John Russell Stephens 2000

Emlyn Williams was a major talent in British theatre. Writer, producer, director, star of stage and screen, he enjoyed popular success on both sides of the Atlantic, acclaimed both for his ensemble acting and his virtuoso one-man shows. Williams was also a man divided; the grammar school boy who went up to Oxford; the labourer's son with gilt-edged bonds; the Welsh speaker at ease in the metropolis; devoted husband yet lover of men. Taking in the first five decades of Williams's life, this book examines the diverse influences which shaped this complex character. The relationship with parents; with his influential teacher Miss Cooke; the relocations - geographic, cultural and social; the allure of bohemia and the obsession with serial murderers: Russell Stephens weaves a compelling narrative which leads us from the Welsh-English Border to 'twenties Oxford; from Lloyd-George's home in Criccieth to West End associations with Gielgud, from gay haunts at the Alhambra Gardens to the National Eisteddfod of Wales. Stephens also provides a critical overview of all Williams's major works, including *The Corn is Green* and *The Last Days of Dolwyn*, and explores his impact and influence on

theatre in Britain during one of its greatest periods.

Featured within the guide are quirky events such as the Cheese-Rolling competition and Tetbury's Woolsack Races; numerous and distinguished breweries and micro-breweries, including the famous Hook Norton Brewery, Bath Ales, Uley Brewery and Stroud Brewery; Oxford University, the world's oldest, and the source of England's longest river, the Thames. The Cotswolds' rich and diverse man-made heritage includes many famous castles and country houses: Blenheim Palace, Sudeley Castle, Chavenage and Kelmscott; well-known abbeys such as Prinknash, Hailes; and gardens and estates including Painswick Rococo Garden, Westonbirt Arboretum and Highgrove. Roman history is covered, too, notably in Bath and Cirencester, together with the Fosse Way, one of the most important Roman roads in the country. The Cotswolds continues to endear itself to anyone who visits - its harmonious combination of quintessentially English villages, charming provincial market towns, interesting and appealing countryside and a

wealth of local food-and-drink producers makes it an all-year-round destination, whether for a day trip, a quiet weekend away or a multi-week holiday.
